## Bab Peacemaker





On August 5, the 3rd BAB PEACEMAKER was held at the DMZ Dorasan Peace Park.

BAB PEACEMAKER is a peaceful reunification movement launched in reflection of the great strife and antagonism between North and South Korea, which remains a sole divided country in the world, due to ideological and political barriers. The movement was initiated to heal the scars and mitigate the pain from the national division through the practice of eating “bab (rice)” together.

The event, held every August, took place once again this year with around 400 people from all walks of life, amid the sweltering heat with the temperature apparently rising to nearly 40°C. At the event, letters to North Korea were read, and there were special performances by the Red Angels, Gwangmyeong Nongak Troupe, and Pyongyang Art Troupe that were met with a feverish response that was hotter than the sun. Afterwards, there was a Sangssari Performance and Babsang Performance, where everyone got to gather at their tables and enjoy a meal together.

After the end of the scheduled program, I stared at the table full of food that had been prepared for the North and South Korean delegations and soldiers, and seeing the chairs completely empty just broke my heart. I ask for your prayers so that next year, this table will become a symbol of reconciliation, with representatives from North and South Korea sharing a meal together.

I also ask that you pray for the opening ceremony of Kamansi Dail Community in the Philippines that is set to be held this coming September. Kamansi is a poverty-stricken area we visited, with absolutely no information, in order to practice sharing and service for some of the poorest people in Cebu.

Currently in Kamansi, we are doing a construction project to do some extension work on a stilt house that has been built as the village hall for the native tribe. In addition to the Babfor and Bbangfor operations, this place will also be used a place of learning for children in Kamansi.

All of us at Dail Community need to play our part right here, right now! Dail Community’s act of sharing, which began with the sharing of a meal in Cheongnyangni, Seoul, has spread to Kamansi, Cebu, Philippines.

I ask for your intercessory prayers so that the miracle of Cheongnyangni can occur in Cebu, Philippines. Thank you!

# The 3rd BAB PEACEMAKER

On August 5, the 3rd BAB PEACEMAKER took place at the Dorasan Peace Park in the demilitarized zone (DMZ). Being unable to disregard the great strife and antagonism between North and South Korea, which remains a sole divided country in the world, due to ideological and political barriers, the 7 Co-Chairpersons and 70 Executive Committee members joined forces to launch BAB PEACEMAKER in August 2015. It's a peaceful reunification movement led by the private sector that aims to help North and South Korea achieve reconciliation by sharing a meal together.

This movement was initiated for North and South Korea to jointly search for a path toward peaceful reunification by healing the scars and mitigating the pain from the national division through the practice of eating "bab (rice)" together.

This year's event was held in the presence of around 400 people from all walks of life including scholars, religious leaders and politicians, who graced us with their presence despite the oppressive heat. The event kicked off with congratulatory speeches from National Assemblyman Byung-doo Min and Soon-heung Chang, the President of Handong Global University.

Ildo Choi, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Dail Community, who recited the Letter of Declaration of BAB PEACEMAKER, shared the purpose of the event stating, "Just as the happiness of a family stems from the dinner table, I hope that the peaceful reunification of our divided homeland starts from the path of reconciliation and conformity through the sharing of a meal."

Afterwards, the Red Angels, Gwangmyeong Nongak Troupe, and Pyongyang Art Troupe presented special performances that received a feverish response, followed by a Sangssari Performance, where everyone poured rice into a massive rice jar, while praying for reunification, and the highlight of the event, which was the Babsang Performance, where all the participants gathered at their tables to enjoy a meal together.

Despite the cumbersome process of obtaining approval from the authorities to enter the restricted area, the sultry weather with the temperature apparently reaching nearly 40°C, and various other difficulties, we were able to conclude this event successfully, without any incident, thanks to the grace of God.

We hope for a peaceful reunification very soon so that the DMZ can be transformed into a meeting place and festival venue for North and South Koreans, and we will strive toward this goal through BAB PEACEMAKER and by playing our part right here, right now. **dail**

## Spreading Love Through Bbangfor in Phnom Penh



Cambodia, which is famous for Angkor Wat - the world's largest stone temple complex with a 1,000-year history, has been achieving rapid growth with a high economic growth rate.

However, it is still plagued by poverty. Its gross domestic product (GDP) is only USD 20 billion, with nearly 20% of its citizens earning less than a dollar a day.

So, in 2004, Dail Community decided to take action and establish a Babfor Center in Andong Thmey Village, the poorest region in Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia, to share rice and bread with the poor.

We finally reached Andong Thmey Village, a town situated just outside Phnom Penh.

By the time we arrived, there were around 200 kids waiting for lunch at the Babfor Center, and they were singing at the top of their lungs.

As soon as the meals were cooked, the kids immediately formed a long waiting line in perfect order.

The volunteers knelt down before the kids, and handed over food trays, while making eye contact with each one of them.

There were even fruits and grilled vegetables to ensure a nutritious and balanced diet for the children.

The center always gives out freshly baked bread to the kids because for some of them, the meal at the center is all the food they have in a day.

"Aw-koon preya, Jesus (Thank you, Jesus)."

The kids accepted the food trays with a thank you.

They then sat down, and nibbled at the food until nothing was left.

The way they ate was absolutely adorable, and watching them made all of us feel the joy of sharing.

## PM2:00

Dail Community is providing baking training to the poor. The apprentices are taught baking techniques and skills, and the bread and pastries that they make are shared with the residents of the poverty-stricken area. Through this program, we get to share skills (Ilfor) and bread (Bbanganfor) with the local residents.

It had been 6 months since the program began, and the trainees, who had a hard time making the dough because they just couldn't get the mixing ratios right, were now able to make the dough and bake 400 loaves of bread all on their own, without any help from their instructor.

There were many varieties of pastries, ranging from sweet red bean buns, soboro bread and cream-filled pastry.

We had a chance to try what they had baked, and they tasted like pastries from a real bakery.

On that day, we took the freshly baked bread and headed toward the residents, living near a landfill.

The residents gathered around after seeing our car from afar.

We had given out bread here before, so the children ran toward us and formed a long line as soon as we laid out a mat to give out the food we had brought.

The kids smiled brightly with bread in their hands.

We faced a bit of difficulty due to the sudden rain shower, which was to be expected in the current rainy season, but seeing the overjoyed children seemed to wash away our fatigue along with the rain.

## PM8:00

In the evening, we drove around the Bbangfor car near Phnom Penh.

In Cambodia, there are people called the "Ekjais," who search for valuable materials among garbage to sell them as a way to make ends meet. They earn about 5 dollars (approx. KRW 5,000) a day, so they are considered the poorest of the poor.

Dail Community hands out around 200 to 300 loaves of bread to the Ekjais two to three times a week. On this day, we brought with us around 200 loaves of bread, and shared them with women who brought their young children with them, a man who was visually impaired, the elderly, and many others over the course of 2 to 3 hours.

The young boy who accompanied his visually impaired father handed the bag of bread, which we had given him, for his father to touch and feel, and he had such a happy look on his face.

The bright smiles that spread across the faces of the Ekjais after receiving bread made us realize once again that a bag of bread can bring so much joy to someone.

So kind and amicable

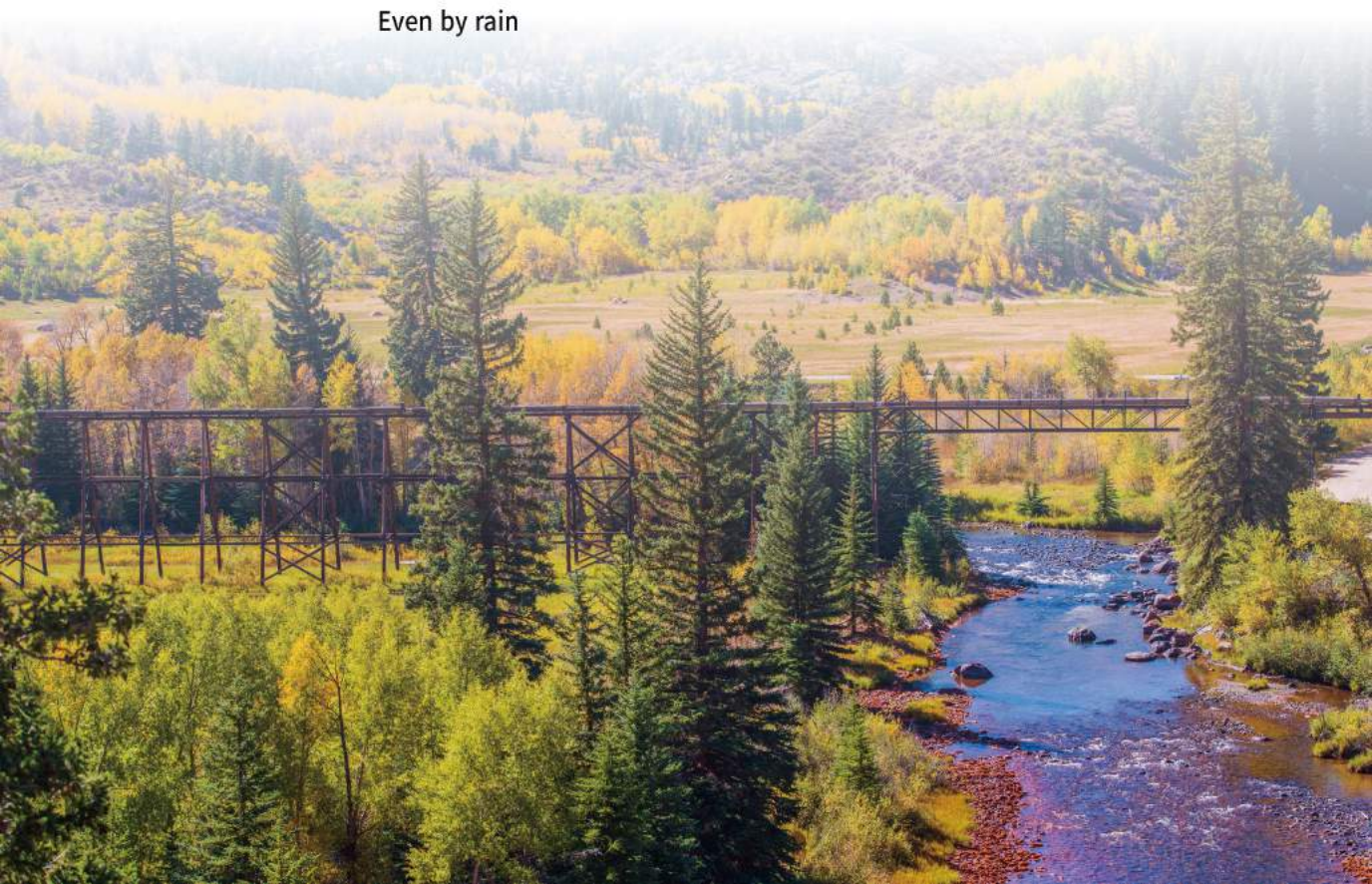
Is the mountain community

**Q1. Tell us about KEPID.**

Korea Electronic Power Industry Development (KEPID), founded in 1990, is celebrating the 27th anniversary of its establishment this year. Some 3,900 executives and employees at 62 business operation sites fulfill the duties of operating and maintaining domestic and overseas power plants, taking measurements from electric meters and so on, thereby contributing to the advancement of the electric power industry, which is one of the key industries of Korea, and convenient use of electricity by the public. Of particular note, we have declared our vision of a “Sustainable Energy Innovative for a Better World” at the beginning of this year to meet the societal demand for a nuclear power, coal and firepower phase-out, and we are striving to become a leading energy company by producing clean and sustainable power and energy such as solar and wind power without destroying the environment.

Also, in following our corporate philosophy of “Realizing a Happy Society,” we organized the KEPID Nanuri Social Volunteer Group in 2006, and have been sharing love within the organization and with our neighbors ever since. Starting this year, we initiated the Sharing the Rice of Love Campaign in full swing to help our undernourished neighbors.

**Q2. Any reason for applying to become an Angelic Company?**

When we visited Babfor to volunteer in the rice sharing program this past March, we were able to witness the traces of the numerous volunteers, who practice sharing as a way to “love [their] neighbor,” all over Babfor. We were also moved by the love and dedication that must have been shown by so many people for that small pot of noodles from 1988 to turn into “1,000 meals” 30 years later today.

That’s why we promised to become an Angelic Company, and decided to offer practical help to Babfor as an energy service company (ESCO). ESCOs are companies that install high-efficiency equipment and materials to reduce energy costs and improve the indoor environment. For instance, replacing fluorescent lamps with LED lamps can help you save on your monthly electricity bills and have a brighter indoor environment, but the initial replacement costs are high.

KEPID's volunteer group is conducting a campaign this year to deliver the Rice of Love to the marginalized class. The Rice of Love is funded by the donations made by the employees, and we've already shared 7 tons of rice with our neighbors this year.

This heartfelt gesture from the employees is rooted in their wishes to share small joys with their neighbors. Employees who received monetary rewards from the company, employees who gained recognition in the In-house Stairway Use Campaign, employees who celebrated their birthdays and many others made small but valuable donations, and expressed their wishes to share their joy with their neighbors. Through their heartfelt gestures, we were able to deliver "love" to our marginalized, vulnerable and poverty-stricken neighbors.

We believe that sharing is possible if you want to share such small joys and have the courage to take action. KEPID will stay committed to being a leader in practicing the valuable act of sharing.

#### Eunice Kim and her family from New Jersey

Deaconess Eunice Kim and her children flew from the U.S. for 30 hours to share love with children in Nepal, and they served at the Babfor Center and the Hope School for a week. She had come with only her son, Senyeong, 3 years ago, but this time, she also brought along her youngest daughter, Danyeong.

They brought a wide range of musical instruments for a fun music class with the students at the Hope School. She even donated her talent by teaching the viola, instilling new dreams among some of the children. Also, she and her children went to the Sindhupalchok District, where they carried out painting work, provided education on hygiene and sanitation, and handed out alternative menstrual pads.

Danyeong turned 16 this year. She met the teen her family was sponsoring, who was the same age as her, and became resolved to live together with her neighbors. Eunice visited to teach her children the reason they must work hard as well as the joy of sharing. Before she left, she thanked us for allowing them to have such a meaningful time here.

We pray that God blesses Eunice Kim, who has taught her children great values, as well as her family, and hope that they continue to practice sharing and service so that their own lives and their neighbors' lives may be enriched in the process.

### Support for building a river bank in Manuhar

Nepal is still heavily reliant on its agricultural industry. Because farming requires a sufficient amount of water, farmers must wait for the rainy season to grow crops and other agricultural products here in Nepal. However, due to climate change, it now rains excessively in the rainy season, followed by a severe drought, which makes the land completely arid.

Nepal Dail Community is located in a village called Manohara. Its name originates from Manohara River, which means "Beautiful River." However, the river has become filthy due to the population density and the fact that all the sewage enters the river without any treatment. The poor from the area bordering India, who have relocated to this village, draw water from this river for daily use. Because of the terrible water quality, most of the children suffer from skin diseases.

Due to these circumstances, Nepal Dail Community has been cleaning up the river and making other efforts to improve the sanitation of the village such as relocating the pig farms away from the river and building communal bathrooms. We have also taken a step further to sustain the sanitary conditions by educating the local residents and raising awareness of the importance of sanitation.

Also, in order to prevent the spread of infectious diseases caused by flooding during the rainy season, we have been building embankments in collaboration with the local residents. We drive in bamboos, pile up sand bags, and tie them all together with robust ropes before piling soil and planting trees on top. This has decreased the frequency of flooding, and the nature-friendly way of building the embankment has helped maintain the natural landscape.

It was possible for Manohara to undergo such a beautiful transformation thanks to the love and support from all of our sponsors. We ask for your continued love and interest so that the children in Manohara can grow healthy and beautiful.

# CAMBODIA

## Mission "Fresh Girl"

The vast majority of children and adolescents in Phnom Krom, where Cambodia Siem Reap Dail Community is located, and Chong kneas, drop out of school due to financial hardships. Most of them enter the labor force in order to help their families make ends meet, and female students, in particular, typically sell photographs and give massages near Tonle Sap Lake.

Many of the kids in this region have never even set foot inside a school, and this is why most kids haven't received the most basic education on hygiene, sanitation and health. Even if they attend school, there are few schools with a public health teacher, so it is nearly impossible for the local girls to gain information on secondary sex characteristics. Girls and women from low-income families can't afford to buy sanitary napkins, and even if they could, there aren't any places that sell these feminine hygiene products in the project area.

Under these circumstances, Cambodia Dail Community plans to supply alternative menstrual pads to around 100 female students in Phnom Krom and Chong kneas, Cambodia between September and November in 2017 under the project name, "Fresh Girl," through the 2017 World Friends NGO Volunteer Program (Korea NGO Council for Overseas Development Cooperation, KCOC).

Prior to the project, we conducted a survey on sanitary napkins administering a questionnaire to the female students at a middle and high school in Phnom Krom. The results showed that a surprisingly large number of female students were using one sanitary napkin a day. All of the survey participants also expressed that they wish to make alternative menstrual pads themselves through our upcoming project.

Through our project, we plan on providing correct information on menstruation and educate girls on the

physical changes that accompany menstruation. We also plan on teaching them what to do during menstruation, and that they should not feel ashamed or overwhelmed by it, in addition to instilling a positive perception of menstruation. Plus, they will be given a chance to make their own cotton menstrual pads as a way to reduce the use of disposable pads, which will help protect the environment as well.

We expect that it will cost KRW 70,000 to make one set of menstrual pads (6 ea.). I ask that you continue offering a helping hand so that the girls living in Phnom Krom and Chong kneas can grow up healthy and happy. Also, I hope that you pray for us and show us your support so that we can conclude this project with great success. Aw-koon preya, Jesus (Thank you, Jesus).

# PHILLIPHINES

## Maayng Takna!

It's been nearly half a year since Dail Community arrived in Kamansi, Cebu to begin its mission work. We came here without absolutely no information or knowledge regarding the area. Looking back on our experiences in this destitute area, where even the language is different from what's spoken in Manila and Cavite, there is nothing that I'm not grateful for.

In Kamansi, we are currently conducting an extension project on the stilt house that has been built as the village hall for the native tribe. The newly added facility will serve as a playground for kids whose parents are paralyzed by addictions, a library, where people can come and read anytime, a cafeteria, where hungry children will be fed, and a bakery, where delicious bread is baked every day.

We also set up a tent in the heart of the village, where we have been giving out bread to children on a daily basis. According to the policy of the company that owns the village square, we simply put up a tent to share bread, but over time, the vivacious energy from the children was added to the tent, which now holds symbolic meaning.

We still have a long way to go, since we are revamping everything, but the changes in Kamansi are now becoming quite noticeable.



Together with our brother Moses, who came to Cebu to support Kamansi Dail Community, we have been picking up garbage and cleaning up filth all over the village. This has motivated those, who had been used

to discarding garbage anywhere, to pick up garbage and clean up their surroundings as well.

Garbage on the streets was replaced with flowers and potted plants, and the bamboo bridge that had become hazardous due to rotting was repaired in cooperation with the villagers.

Spending time with and praying for the destitute every single day, in addition to practicing sharing, has not only led to changes in the environment of the village, but also made the local residents open their hearts to us. We were officially accepted as members of the indigenous society (The Lumad) of the Philippines, and designated as honorary peace ambassadors. We even received native names and registration certificates, which now allow us to visit other tribal villages freely.

Of course, things haven't always been good, but whenever we were faced with adversities, God lent His hand, and with a sense of gratitude, we are boldly carrying out our mission. Please pray for Kamansi Dail Community, which will be holding its opening ceremony on September 17. I ask for your prayers and support so that we can continue to do our best, fulfilling our given tasks.

### We need your help!

1. We need ovens, mixers, rollers and other baking equipment and tools to open a bakery so that we can share bread with more than 500 kids every day and to help the indigenous people become self-sufficient.
2. We need books, toys, stationery, etc. for children so that Kamansi Dail Community can become a playground and library for kids.
3. We need ointments, vitamin supplements, medical supplies, etc. to treat skin diseases and water-borne diseases in Kamansi, where there is a lack of clean water for drinking and washing.

# TANZANIA



Jong Won Park, Director of Tanzania Dail Community

### Protect the people of Tanzania from malaria!

Tanzania Dail Community is committed to the mission in the poverty-stricken Kunduchi quarry site, where a village has been formed by people from rural areas who migrated to Dar es Salaam, a metropolitan city, in hopes of a better life. Because the homes were not built legally, none of them has a plot number.

A small wave of changes has been sweeping across this village. Those who had occupied the land here first and built themselves mud homes have been saving up money to build themselves brick homes. This is why there is a mix of brick and cement houses and mud houses in this area.

The poorest people in this destitute area are those who live in mud houses. In Tanzania, the rainy season lasts from March to May, during which a considerable

amount of rain falls, just like in the monsoon season in Korea. The heavy rain causes holes that are as big as a person's face to form all over the mud houses, and in severe cases, an entire wall may even collapse.

During this season, malaria-carrying mosquitoes become a major problem. Last year, a sponsor from America made a donation that allowed us to give mosquito nets to some 250 households. This year, we wish to give this life-saving gift to 300 households. Mosquito nets are the bare minimum measure to prevent malaria.

Every home may be equipped with mosquito nets, but they are so old that they have been worn out and don't serve their proper function. It'll cost KRW 2 million to purchase 300 mosquito nets. I pray that there will be angels making donations for mosquito nets that will help prevent malaria infection among the local residents of Kunduchi, including children.

### Protect young children from the sun and rain!

Babfor receives over 900 children these days. We start distributing food at noon, but the kids come as early as 10 a.m. in anticipation of eating rice or bread and juice, which they normally don't get to eat. The sun rays in Tanzania are much more intense than in Korea or the U.S., and I personally can't bear it without sunglasses.

When kids wait in line to receive food, they become exposed to the burning sun. Sometimes, they even get drenched in rain. We hope to protect the kids from the sun and the rain by installing a sidewalk and a retractable awning to shield them. This will cost KRW 4 million. We are praying for angels who will

sponsor Babfor so that our kids can stay safe. Thank you. **DAIL**

### Soothing the soul and providing treatment to the residents

Dail Little Heaven is running an art therapy program, with the financial assistance provided as part of the 2017 Rehabilitation Program for the Homeless operated with support from the Ministry of Health and Welfare and Seoul Metropolitan Government.

The art therapy program will be run for around 6 months, and instructors with experience and expertise were carefully selected to make sure that the program will be fun, interesting and effective. There will be three art therapy sessions a month, taking place from 2 to 3 p.m. for up to 15 residents on the third floor of Dail Little Heaven.

The previous art therapy program, with three sessions a month, centered on turning art into a pastime, whereas the current program aims to help achieve

psychologically therapeutic effects by soothing the participants mentally. I asked one of the participants whether he plans to keep participating in the program, and he replied, "It was very fun, and the instructors were very enthusiastic during the lecture. I'd like to keep participating in the future. I love how I feel so calm while doing art."

We've scheduled a field trip to Heiri Munhwa Village in Paju, and the seniors who have heard about this plan are already excited. You can't imagine how grateful we are to be able to provide such wonderful experiences to our residents, thanks to the Ministry of Health and Welfare and Seoul Metropolitan Government. We ourselves will dedicate our efforts to creating a fun-filled and effective program that all of the participants can be satisfied with.

### The final footsteps of our residents...

Dail Little Heaven is a hospice facility for seriously ill patients and patients with terminal cancer among the homeless. We help the terminally ill patients spend their final days in a warm environment, rather than alone in a harsh environment on the streets. For those who have had difficult relationships with their families, we help them achieve reconciliation in their final moments so that they may rest in peace, and we do our best to share joy and sadness with our residents and provide solace in a family-like environment.

We've also been running a special program, which is none other than the Send-off to Heaven Program. There have been 8 sessions so far, with three in 2014, two in 2016 and three in 2017 until July. It's a funeral assistance program, which has been unprecedented among hospice facilities for the homeless. The staff play the role of the deceased's family, giving up their days off to carry out the coffining, funeral procession and cremation ceremonies.

Every human being deserves to be blessed as soon as he or she is born. Regardless of the paths taken in life, everyone deserves to be respected and admired for the countless trials and tribulations they've endured. This is why we believe we must give our all to help our residents die with dignity. With this in mind, we will continue our Send-off to Heaven Program at Dail Little Heaven until the day when no one dies alone on the streets.



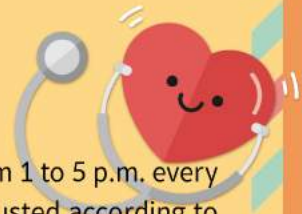
