The Babfor Sharing Movement began one cold day in November 1988, about 30 years ago, when a young man walking past the square in front of Cheongnyangni Station treated an old man who had collapsed from hunger with a warm bowl of soup.

While many people might think that it is the job of civil servants or the police to help our less fortunate neighbors, and that common folk lack the resources to help the poor, the young man was reminded of Jesus' teachings to serve thy neighbor, inspiring him to buy the man some food. It was that moment the Babfor Sharing Movement began. For the past thirty years, every single day, the Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters has prepared meals to serve to our less fortunate neighbors. As of 2017, the movement has 17 branches in 10 countries including Korea, and has served an astonishing 10 million meals so far. The movement, which began as a humble effort sharing instant noodles in a corner of Cheongnyangni Station square, has now spread to the likes of China, Vietnam, Cambodia, the Philippines, Nepal, and Tanzania and Uganda in Africa.

Comparing Korea's social welfare system at the time of the Seoul Olympic Games in 1988 to now, it has seen dazzling growth over the past thirty years. Unfortunately, Korea in the 21st century is facing an entirely new social problem, namely its aging population.

In the first days of Babfor as well, senior citizens living alone made up the majority of our community. The situation is very much the same today. Whereas we have seen large growth in the numbers and quality of facilities and social safety devices for the homeless, the welfare of our elderly citizens is fast becoming a social issue as the entire population ages in general.

In keeping with the changing circumstances, the Babfor Sharing Movement intends to reinforce our functions in comprehensive protection and abuse prevention for senior citizens. We aim to develop improved professional expertise in current social issues, establishing for ourselves a new vision and ensuring we can better practice the spirit of sharing and service.

Unlike in advanced economies, poverty is an all too familiar reality in Korea as one ages. Even people who are employed into middle age find themselves exposed to poverty as they reach old age, unless they have a source of income, and are left to fend for themselves, without social protection. Further, social enmity between social classes is increasing as the wealth gap widens, and the social and cultural rift between today's senior citizens and youth is causing the rise of a new form of social strife, a hate toward the elderly.

The Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters, while remaining primarily devoted to providing elderly citizens with nutrition, intends to engage in job creation for senior citizens and abuse prevention efforts in the long term. We will take our first steps toward creating a more beautiful world where we are all respected and respect one another, where respectful treatment of one's neighbors is the norm. The Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters wishes to help senior citizens become not just passive recipients of protection but active members of society who lead a wholesome lifestyle. We ask our members for continued interest and kind words of encouragement so that we might accomplish these goals.

Until no one goes hungry in this land - This has been our motto up until now. From now on, we will dedicate ourselves to ensuring happiness for all members of our society.

Midas IT – Happiness and Sharing, Worth the While

Please tell us about Midas IT.

Midas IT is a company that develops and supplies software for science and technology simulations. We develop and supply programs for computer simulation of apartment buildings, office buildings, factories and other building structures so that they can be designed economically to withstand natural phenomena such as earthquakes or strong winds and tested thoroughly before actual construction. We are also engaged in JOB projects, which brings together prime candidates with the best companies to work for.

What is the reason many younger people rank your company as their most preferred place of employment?

In a survey conducted in 2016 by the Chosun Ilbo, 320,000 job-seeking candidates ranked us first among

the small and medium enterprises they would like to work with. We conducted our own survey as well, asking our new recruits why they applied to come on board. 85% of respondents answered that they liked the company's management philosophy, and the second most popular answer was the high wages and good welfare. We'd like to think Midas IT is a company that properly nurtures and treats talent.

We'd like to know why your core corporate value is happiness.

Midas IT's core values are happiness, worthwhileness, and sharing. These core values were inspired by the proposition that the final goal of management is ultimately 'people'. Happiness is something that all people want, and achieving happiness requires translating personal value into utility for the world. The satisfaction from successfully doing so is what we call worthwhileness. Since the value created in the process is obtained from the world around us, it is only natural for it to be shared.

Your company is known for being active in sharing and community service. What are some of these activities?

On Sharing Day, the first Saturday of each month, we volunteer at a soup kitchen for the homeless and the elderly living alone. Once a month, our chefs at Midas' employee cafeteria prepare lunch boxes that are delivered to households by our employees and executives. These lunch boxes provide the elderly with much-needed warm meals. In addition, we volunteer in swimming classes where we help the disabled with swimming rehabilitation, help neighbors in need to bathe themselves, and host a marathon twice a year for all of our employees and executives, donating 5,000 Won per 1km run. The company matches the donations collected by our employees and executives, and directs the funds toward rehabilitation efforts for those suffering from rare or difficult-to-cure diseases. Further, our donations have sent mosquito nets and vaccines to Africa, and dug new wells in regions of India where residents have no access to clean drinking water.

How did you come to know about the Dail Foundation?

Midas IT and the Dail Welfare Foundation have been partners since 2008. Our employees and executives have regularly participated in Babfor community service activities. To be honest, Midas IT has been focusing our sharing activities on the local community, limiting opportunities for direct partnerships with the Dail Welfare Foundation. Starting in 2018, however, we intend to start our sharing activities again, hand in hand with the Dail Welfare Foundation. Professor Park Sang-Won, who is a director of the Midas Happiness Foundation, is also a public relations ambassador for the Dail Welfare Foundation, and a bridge between the two organizations. We are delighted to join hands again in creating a better world.

We appreciate your donation toward the establishment of the Dail Vision Center in Tanzania. Is there anything you would like to see in the Vision Center?

First, we are honored to have been able to take part in establishing the Vision Center in Tanzania. We sincerely hope that the youth of Tanzania can find jobs and become independent through the Vision Center, breaking the vicious cycle of poverty and giving hopes and dreams to the children who will become Tanzania's future leaders. We hope that the Vision Center will be filled with the happiness and laughter of children.

What are Midas IT's future plans and goals?

Midas IT's mission is "to create a happier world through technology". Alongside our existing business of science and technology simulation software, we plan to take a more aggressive approach toward humancentered management solutions. Midas' recruitment solution 'inAIR' bridges talent and good workplaces to boost the total amount of happiness in the world, and is innovating processes to allow corporations to find and recruit the best talent. Further, we aim to depart from conventional physical capital-based management practices centering around funds, sales, production and distribution. The ERP solution 'inHR' incorporates the management systems of Midas IT, which has established itself as a world-leading corporation through our human-centered management. The solution is a valuable tool for the growth and progress of Korean small and medium enterprises. In addition, to make humanity happier through technology, and make the world more beautiful through sharing, we will continue to share with our neighbors to mitigate their pain and suffering. Keep your eyes on Midas IT as we serve through love and sharing, and strive to create a happier world where nobody is left behind.

Please comment on the Dail Welfare Foundation and the Dail Community in Tanzania.

We believe that helping neighbors in need should not be a special event but something that happens naturally in everyday life. Coming Together to Share Love

What kind of company is 'Happy Baobab'?

'Happy Baobab' is a board game company that develops and sells board games. While board games are a relatively novel field in Korea, the truth is, games such as Go and Korean chess are actually board games. Board games are set apart from PC, mobile and video console games in that the fun lies in meeting and playing with other people in person.

A single giant baobab tree provides shade and shelter for countless plants and animals. The name 'Happy Baobab' reflects our aim to give happiness to all of our employees and all consumers buying our products.

What inspired you to create educational board games?

Around 2004, there was a board game craze in Korea. At the time, most of the board games we had were licensed foreign games we had purchased from overseas, and games developed domestically were few and far between. We started board game development with the aim of "creating board games for our own enjoyment with our own hands."

The thing is, Korean consumers often do not have the time and space to invest in just fun. Accordingly, we tried to find educational value in board games. Currently, 'Happy Baobab' is a well-recognized educational board game developer among Korean consumers, and our products are especially popular among parents with children at the kindergarten, elementary school and middle school levels. Our board games are a popular educational tool for afterschool programs and private academies.

Please tell us about Happy Baobab's unique advantages.

The domestic board game market is still on the small side. One thing that sets us apart from other board game companies is that we are involved not only in development and sales, but also publishing. Publishing means purchasing an idea from an individual and developing it into a product. We are currently engaging numerous developers not just in Korea but abroad as well, and developing their ideas into products for domestic and overseas sales.

We take pride in being the only board game company involved firsthand in publishing as well, and are confident we have an advantage in the specialized field of educational board games.

You recently made a special donation to the Dail Welfare Foundation, and we are curious about the story behind that. What made you donate to the Dail Welfare Foundation?

Our company closes down twice a year, for summer and winter vacation. We always have a ceremony before the vacation starts, and each time we hold an auction where we sell off items that hold special meaning. Everyone brings something of personal value to the office, which we auction off, and the company matches the proceeds from the sales. The combined funds are then donated. The event is intended to encourage our employees to join in the happiness of giving, even if it's only a small amount.

We vote to decide where our donations will go each time, and this time around, the Dail Welfare Foundation was chosen among 10 candidate organizations. One of our employees who had known about the Babfor Movement for a while recommended the Dail Welfare Foundation, and we believe the fact that your foundation is helping the homeless, who are having an especially difficult time during this year's bitter cold winter, was the reason so many of our employees voted for you.

We visited your website, and got the impression that your operations were being run in a much more systematic manner than some other organizations. We were confident that your foundation would put our employees' precious donations to good use, and went ahead to make the donation.

Please tell us about Happy Baobab's future plans and objectives.

Our goal at 'Happy Baobab' is to become a company that gives happiness to many. Also, we would like to transform people's daily patterns. Board games' biggest enemies are Korea's late working hours and drinking culture. As society breaks up into smaller and smaller family units, and people are having less and less time to interact with each other in person, it is becoming more and more difficult to find the time and space to enjoy board games. We would like to see society change in a way that allows our company to

grow, and are working hard to make such a society a reality. You could say our plan and objective is to create a virtuous cycle through board games.

Any last comments?

Our President is very interested in donating and community service, believing that sharing is a must if we are to make life happier. As our company continues to grow, we expect to see more and more opportunities to give and share.

We had heard a lot about 'Babfor', and found out a lot more about the Dail Welfare Foundation through the recent event. We were impressed to see that the foundation was involved not only in free meals but a variety of other activities as well.

The more foundations like yours grow, the better society becomes. We stand behind you.

The True Miracle of \$100

We would like to share a story of Hwang Il-Gyu and Lee Eun-Won.

A couple visits us at Babfor on March 4th of each year. Hwang Il-Gyu and Lee Eun-Won have been helping out at the Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters in Cheongnyangni on their wedding anniversary every year since 2016, and this year marks their third year. Instead of spending quality time alone on their special day, this beautiful couple engages with society by volunteering and sharing. This year, they took part in an extra-special sponsorship opportunity.

It all began with a phone call at the Dail Welfare Foundation's Donations Management Office. Mrs. Lee Eun-Won was on her way to exchange her dollar bills, when she was reminded of the Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters' '\$100 Miracle' campaign.

With an excited voice, she asked "I heard a hundred dollars is enough to feed 300 children - Is that true?"

The '\$100 Miracle' campaign takes donations of \$100 (approximately 110,000 Korean Won) from individual donors, which are sent to various overseas branches of the Dail Community engaged in the Babfor campaign where the money is used to serve warm meals to hungry children. Dail's overseas branches share warm meals with 300 to 400 children daily, alongside love and the gospel.

Through Hwang Il-Gyu and Lee Eun-Won's '\$100

Miracle' donation, the Dail Community of Nepal was able to purchase rice and lentils, a staple of the Nepalese, and treat the Nepalese children of the community to a hearty meal. After sharing, we showed the couple photos that the Dail Community of Nepal had sent us of the children enjoying their meal and showing their appreciation. The couple were delighted, and said they wanted more people to know about the '\$100 Miracle' campaign.

Thanks to Mrs. Lee Eun-Won's passionately spreading the word, some of her acquaintances also joined in the '\$100 Miracle' campaign. Mrs. Kim Eun-Jeon, Mrs. Cha Seong-Ja, Mrs. Kim Jeong-Rye and Mrs. Choi Seon-Hwa are all members of the Ludia Fellowship.

The Ludia Fellowship is a group of home-schooling tutors who have been gathering once a month for 12 years to study the Bible. Some of the members remain tutors, and others have moved on, but their Bible studies and personal friendships have kept the gathering going. The donations from the Ludia Fellowship were sent to the Dail Community of Cambodia, were numerous children received a heartwarming meal and a bunch of love.

Mr. Hwang Il-Gyu and Mrs. Lee Eun-Won currently operate a café named 'Her Dreams' in Suyu-dong of Gangbuk-gu ward.

The pink-themed café run by this beautiful couple certainly catches the eye. The couple tells us that they want to spread the word about the '\$100 Miracle' campaign to encourage more people to participate, and see more people take the opportunity to share warm meals with children around the world.

Our Daily Bread

A large part of funding for the Babfor (free meals) program goes toward rice. No matter how delicious the side dishes are, there's something missing without a bowl of rice to eat them with. That makes rice an essential part of the Babfor program, and naturally, it accounts for a large part of the costs. The Babfor program requires 380kg of rice a month, which is provided by a Korean corporation in Vietnam so that we can serve the most nutritious and tasty rice everyday. It is always a proud moment to see our pantry filled to the brim with rice. We're sure a lot of our readers are curious to find out who this generous sponsor is, but they tell us it is their internal policy to maintain anonymity in community service.

The Dail Community of Vietnam's Bapfor program runs from Tuesday to Saturday. Weekly meal

preparation costs are handed to our current partner, the Tan Hung People's Committee, to make the preparation of a variety of foods possible every day. Vietnamese law prohibits foreigners from distributing food to the Vietnamese people, and accordingly, the Dail Community of Vietnam has partnered with the Tan Hung People's Committee in running the Bapfor program. We are learning on a daily basis that working together for good is made possible by relationships. The rice that our kind sponsor provides is especially meaningful. It is more than just rice – it represents a precious meal to the hungry, and a stepping stone toward building relationships. We hope that our small efforts will build up to form a humble but important focal point for communication between our two countries.

The Phil-Dail Kindergarten has held its seventh graduation ceremony. 35 children attended the event, all dressed up, holding their parents' hands. Watching them sitting anxiously and in anticipation of the event was truly an endearing experience. The power of education is truly astounding. These children were crying and begging their mothers not to leave them behind on their first day of school, but over the course of a year, they have been nurtured by our teachers' love and passion and have grown not just in height but in knowledge as well. We know, however, that the real reason behind the children's impressive growth was the invisible hand that is the love from our donors.

A very unfortunate incident occurred in Paradise Village, no more than 300 meters away from our Kamansi Dail Community Center. A large fire erupted one night, causing several children to lose their lives, and the residents to lose their homes and livelihoods.

The village was completely burned down overnight, leaving it in total ruins. Chased by the flames, numerous people jumped into the sea and swam to safety at our center, narrowly escaping death.

The next day, we frantically went about baking bread to help our neighbor in need. We visited each of the makeshift tents the refugees had erected as temporary shelter, handing out loaves of bread. Though it was a meek effort, we prayed earnestly that the Lord would help them find consolation. Among the four basic human emotions - happiness, anger, sadness, and pleasure – the Filipino are great at expressing happiness and pleasure, but not so much anger and sadness. Seeing them smile even after losing everything overnight brought incredible sadness and tears to our eyes.

It was as if the Lord was asking "who are your real neighbors?" We hurried onto Facebook and embarked on an emergency fundraising campaign. Thankfully, we received donations from Korea and Cebu, and on the morning of Easter, we were able to distribute rice to each of the refugee households. The poverty-stricken residents of Kamansi village could have also used the aid, but we asked them for their understanding since the rice was meant for the refugees. Everybody understood, and even helped us pack up the rice for distribution. As it turns out, the disaster became an opportunity for us to strengthen our bonds with local communities.

There are numerous language schools in the Philippines, and the M.J. Academy in Cebu sends out monthly community services delegations. At the M.J. Academy, Principal Yang Hyuk teaches children ranging from elementary schoolers to undergraduates not only in language but also faith and character-building. Each month, Principal Yang, other instructors, and students come to our center to serve the community. This month, they came with clothing and various supplies to help the refugees. Together, we handed out the supplies, baked bread, distributed meals, and even made donations. We greatly appreciate the passion with which Principal Yang and the M.J. Academy serve the children, and wish them blessings and boundless progress.

Jaimashi! This is Bhuban Timsina of the Dail Community of Nepal.

The Dail Community of Nepal operates, in addition to a Babfor program, one-on-one child sponsorships, sewing machine classes, a Hope School, and a kindergarten. The Nepali New Year begins in April, when children advance to the next grade and the schools get ready to welcome in new students. At Hope School, we administer placement tests and provide instruction for new students and existing students who transfer out to ordinary schools. While we provide alternative education to students too poor to attend ordinary schools, thanks to our passionate teachers, we send out transferees every year. Watching them develop respectable writing and drawing skills as well, we are impressed by the power of education.

Now for some news from our kindergarten. At long last, we went on our field trip. Since many of the children had never been on a bus before, we packed plenty of plastic bags along with samosas, namkeen, a popular children's snack, hard boiled eggs, juice and bananas and rode to Kathmandu's one and only zoo. The zoo is only 20 minutes away from the village by car, but unfortunately, many people will never have the opportunity to visit if not during a kindergarten field trip. The children were less interested in the animals and more intrigued with the animal-shaped balloons tied outside the stores lining the street, and it took a few tantrums and a whole lot of crying before we could move on. Once we did, however, the children were excited to watch the fascinating animals. After their first field trip, the children all fell asleep on the bus on the way back. Maybe they were dreaming of climbing the Himalayas atop an elephant.

The orphanage building that is being built in Sindhupalchok District has been built to withstand any earthquake that may come, with a sturdy foundation and more and better materials. The columns for the ground floor have been put in place, and the ceiling, which will serve as the floor for the first floor, is being built. It is pleasing to see everyone working hard on the site as if they were building their own homes.

We at the Dail Community of Nepal live each day in thanks and happiness, even without outside volunteer teams visiting us.

While Nepalese policy changes might mean the current center may be replaced by roads and a green belt, we continue to pray to the Lord daily for guidance.

We hope that the children that the Dail Community of Nepal has helped nurture over the last 10 years will become the Moses and Joshuas of Nepal.

The Primary 7 Program Comes to a Close

The youth program for Primary 7 students we introduced in our last newsletter has finally come to a close, after 3 months. While the program, like any other, began quietly and with a lot of awkwardness, we are sorry to see it end.

Before beginning the program, we conducted a survey to find out what participants wanted to do, and tried to accommodate their requests as much as possible. Reverend Richard, who lived in Korea for 8 years and graduated from the Asia United Theological University's International Graduate School, taught the children important bible stories and acted as a mentor, providing faith counseling and career guidance.

At the end of the program, we went on a field trip to a zoo, which none of the children had ever been to. The zoo is operated by the Ugandan government and located by Lake Victoria, and is visited by a surprising 260,000 people each year. The facilities were clean and orderly, and the animals had relatively wide spaces to roam. All of the children, youths and adults on the trip found the experience satisfying.

Watching the students stare at the animals in wonder, we agreed that we should have these opportunities more frequently. Also, building on our first program, we will bolster the program to make the new Primary 7 program richer and more contentfilled.

We hope that, as intended by the program, that children will be able to build a closer relationship with the bible in this important phase of their development, learn how to work with each other and serve the community, develop an understanding of gender equality, human rights and rights in general, and grow into sound citizens of the world.

Bringing Children to School, and Girls Suffering from Sickle Cell Anemia

The Dail Community is interested in engaging students outside of school, and runs education programs for these children. According to an MOU signed in October of last year, we were referred to 26 families recommended by the local leader LC1 (village foreman), who we visited together with a teacher from Kitiko Primary School.

The children we visited included a boy of 11 years who had not yet begun school because his father died while working in South Sudan and whose mother is HIV positive, and a girl who had left school in the fourth grade when her mother was no longer able to afford schooling for all her siblings when her father drowned while fishing in a lake.

There were a large number of students who, due to various reasons, were unable to go to governmentsponsored primary schools to receive the benefits of universal education. These students were not receiving protection from society, and were left to fend for themselves. Thankfully, with help from Uniwell, deacons at Uganda Korean Church, and donors, we were able to bring 16 of the children we met back to school where they continue to study and play with their friends. We would again like to express our appreciation for your love. However, there still are numerous children praying for the day they return to school and waiting for a donor. Please let the people around you know about the work we are doing.

We have also arranged sponsorships for girls suffering from sickle cell anemia, a hereditary disease. Deacons at Uganda Korean Church agreed to sponsor the children, with the Women's Mission Association at Uganda Korean Church agreeing to cover the cost of medication for the girls. We thank the church for continuing to share and serve the community, even after their generous donation from their Christmas bazaar last year.

Protect Our Children from Malaria!

The rainy season of Tanzania runs from March to May. The rains begin in March, then pick up in April and continue until May. The children in the village by the Kunduchi Stone Quarry are always exposed to malaria, but after the rainy season is when the real trouble starts. Even outside the rainy season, several people contract malaria and are taken to hospital by our staff, but once the rainy season is over, the malaria mosquitos explode in number.

One of the most basic ways of protecting children from malaria is to hand out family mosquito nets. In particular, children who live in mud huts often find fist-sized holes in the wall after the rainy season. This 100% guarantees exposure to mosquitos without a mosquito net.

Accordingly, the Dail Community of Tanzania, together with the foundation headquarters in Korea, began the 'Kakao Value Together" program to raise funds to distribute mosquito nets to some 800+ households in Kunduchi village. We encourage our

Seeking Donors to Help Out Nesseliani Stefano

Nesseliani lies with her aunt, grandmother and aunt. Her father left before she was born, and has not been heard from since. Her family moved from their rural village to Kunduchi in search of better living conditions, but life remains challenging. Her mother works as a kitchen assistant in a nearby market where she makes around 2,000 Won a day. Her aunt lost her sight while smashing rocks at the quarry, forcing her to stay at home, and her grandmother gathers and sells empty plastic bottles to contribute to the household.

Fortunately, Nessliani's sponsors provide rice or corn meal every month, along with tuition and school supplies so that she can focus on her studies. Her grandmother comes to the Hope Class at lunch time daily to receive free meals.

Nesseliani and her family have been praying desperately for one thing for the past few years, however. The family moved to Kunduchi onto a small plot of land that her grandmother had used her entire life savings to buy, but the family lives in an unsafe shack made with wood and steel sheets and would like more than anything to have a sturdy house made with bricks. Even their toilet is out in the open covered by a tent, and is just a hole in the ground where they hope to someday have a proper toilet. However, the family is dependent on food and assistance from the Dail Community since her grandmother is no longer able to work and her aunt has no income, and having a brick house seems to be an impossible dream.

We are seeking donors to provide funding for Nesseliani's new house - she is a girl who likes to run and aspires to become a teacher in the future. A 3-bedroom house with a single bathroom will cost 4 million Won (\$4,000). Become a donor and help Nesseliani, who studies hard and eagerly serves the community despite the hardships of poverty, on her path to becoming a teacher!

The Cheers for the Korean Youth Babfor Community Service Team from the U.S.A!

We would like to introduce the story of Choi Yu-Jin, a member of the Korean Youth Babfor Community Service Team of America and her mother, who flew from the United States to faraway Phnom Penh of Cambodia last March.

Choi Yu-Jin, a high school junior in Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Connecticut, discovered the Dail Community's mission through her friend Lee Woo-Jae, who led a campaign in 2017 to raise funds for tuk-tuk transports (a local motorcycle transport with a cargo compartment) for the Babfor program of the Daily Community of Cambodia. Impressed, she engaged in fundraising activities for the Dail Community in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, and in order to deliver the funds raised and take part in Babfor community service activities, she flew all the way to Cambodia from the United States and returned to the States after just one day to continue her studies. We were truly touched by Yu-Jin and her mother, who served the community all day from early in the morning and left telling us they would be back to help out for longer next time.

We would like to share here the touching letter that Yu-Jin sent us after returning to the United States.

"Dear Director, this is Choi Yu-Jin. I am attending Miss Porter's School in Connecticut, and I had the pleasure of serving your community with you this week. Last year, I found out about the Dail Community of Cambodia's Babfor tuk-tuk fundraising efforts from Woo-Jae, a friend of mine since elementary school. I was inspired by the effort and ended up making a donation. Watching your Babfor on-the-go community services, I decided I wanted to take part in Babfor community services myself.

Through Woo-Jae, I collected information and prepared promotional materials. I convinced the school to let me run a 5-day fundraising campaign. I was always interested in cooking, and based on my experience helping my mother prepare food, I decided to make and sell kimchi fried rice and Korean sugar-filled pancakes. I bought the materials with my

allowance, and began the fundraising sales. I did suffer some minor burns while preparing the food, and found myself completely exhausted, but watching my school friends enjoy the food I prepared made it all worth the while. I raised \$200 in donations through the sales, but I wanted to raise more money to help the children of Cambodia. I went to Korea over spring break where I told my father and his friends about Babfor and the situation the Cambodian children were faced with. They kindly donated an additional \$1070 in funds.

The moment I handed the donations from my school and from Korea to the Director of the Dail Community of Cambodia was a truly fulfilling and happy experience. While preparing and sharing meals firsthand with Babfor, I learned a lot, although my visit was all too short. I was truly impressed by your mission of sharing and serving the local children through Babfor on a daily basis despite the difficult circumstances, and was very touched that it was a Korean NGO spearheading the effort to aid the community.

I hope, and prayed, that Babfor would be able to help the children, who are currently faced with hardship, to transform and effect progress in Cambodia once they come of age. The biggest reward from serving with the Dail Community of Cambodia was a sense of 'appreciation'. I have learned to be thankful for and cherish the things I have, and wish to find new and better ways of sharing what I have. I hope to return to Cambodia to meet the children again, and serve the community once more."

After the Babfor service, Yu-Jin told us she learned a lot from the experience and received more from it than she gave. She said she would continue to ponder new ways of serving the community even after returning to school, and promised to contact us if there was any good news. We welled up with pride for students like Yu-Jin in the United States who find it in their heart to help out even in the middle of their studies. We hope this story inspires other Korean-American students as well. The Korean Youth Babfor Community Service Team of America is currently looking for new members.

Miracle of Feeding the Multitude

Sharing a Meal Can Bring Happiness to Our Neighbors

There was a news article about a day laborer living in a jjokbang (a tiny room in a flophouse) setting a fire in the communal kitchen of the flophouse after having starved for more than ten days and stabbing a resident who tried to put the fire out (Dong-a Ilbo, Feb. 6). He committed this violent act, as he couldn't control his anger arising from the fact that he had to starve for days after being unable to find any day jobs in the wintertime. The victim later said that he empathized with his neighbor, who had injured him. He earnestly tried to understand the man, who had felt such deep fury and despair arising from hunger that he went as far as taking out his anger on an innocent man. Under this news article, a person left a comment saying, "If he had been so hungry, he should've gone to a free meal service center, instead of committing a crime," and as a reply, one person wrote, "Do you think that you can find a free meal service center just anywhere? They don't operate everywhere or at all hours." A meal not only satiates one's hunger, but it also provides a small hope of survival. Today, at Babfor Sharing Movement Headquarters, around 600 people suffering from hunger visited for a meal. Around 600 people come to us on a daily basis, not only from the Cheongnyangni area, but from afar to ease their hunger in the cold winter. It is your helping hand that is saving their lives. For KRW 10,000 a month, you can help us provide warm meals to 600 neighbors in need. We hope for a beautiful world, where we can all live together in harmony.

Heavenly Sendoff Program for Mr. Gwak Do Hyun (pseudonym)

At Dail Little Heaven, we set out to make sure the homeless do not spend their last moments in loneliness. Together with other residents at our center and our employees, we arranged an event to pray for the souls of the departed. The aim of the event was to reunite the deceased with their families in an occasion for forgiveness and grieving, helping to send off the departed in a dignified manner.

In 2018, the Heavenly Sendoff Program (a program to help hospice patients prepare for the end) arranged for the departure of Mr. Gwak Do Hyun.

This is the story of Mr. Gwak Do Hyun, according to his own account, told before his departure.

Amid the economic turmoil following the Asian Financial Crisis, Mr. Gwak found himself jobless. To maintain a livelihood, he became a day laborer, and tried his best to make ends meet, showing up for work early in the morning and trying to gain the foremen's favor.

Despite his efforts, on many days he would find himself without work. On the lucky days when he found work, he would spend his nights at cheap inns or public baths, and when he ran out of what little money he had, he would rough it in the bus terminal or in hospital emergency rooms.

Not wanting to continue to live this way, he attempted suicide, but ended up waking up. Full of anger toward the cold and hostile reality of the world, he only had alcohol and cigarettes to numb his suffering. Then, one day, a friend arranged for him to work as a taxi driver. Thankful for the opportunity, he worked hard and saved up, dreaming of success once again. However, a colleague who had promised to double his money and to whom Mr. Gwak had given all of his savings lost all of it gambling. Mr. Gwak was devastated, but intent on not returning to his old ways, he convinced himself it was not over and continued to work hard as a taxi driver.

However, Mr. Gwak often found himself unable to work due to unbearable pain. He missed out on work days, and clocked fewer hours. He found himself owing the company money, and was forced to leave the company and wander the streets.

While homeless, he saw a sign for free rehabilitative medical services. He wanted to reach out for help, but had no way of contacting the service since he had no money and no phone. He built up the courage to ask a woman who was passing by to lend

him her phone. Although people nowadays would mostly walk away if a homeless person asked for help, the woman kindly dialed the number for him, and soon the paramedics from the free rehabilitative services came to pick him up. Until his last days, he could not forget the kind lady who stood by his side and did not leave until the paramedics transported him away.

The paramedics arranged for a checkup at a general hospital. After recovering his health and being discharged from the hospital, Mr. Gwak was determined to live life to the fullest again. He visited the Rehabilitation Center but was told his options were limited and was referred to another facility. After spending 6 months at the facility, he was determined to overcome his cancer, and began living a healthier lifestyle. While searching for a facility where he could stay that was near a hospital where he could receive treatment, he found Dail Little Heaven, a care center for the homeless.

While living in the facility, he underwent chemotherapy but remained determined that he would stand on his own two feet again one day, paying off his debts. He recovered somewhat after his colon cancer surgery, but the cancer had spread to his liver. He was unable to eat and vomited constantly, and after 1~3 months of suffering, he lost consciousness and was transferred to emergency services at the National Medical Center.

He passed away while hospitalized, and it was heartbreaking that he was unable to find family or relatives to stand by him in his last moments. Dail Little Heaven arranges special heavenly sendoffs for people like Mr. Gwak. Although all of us deserve to die a dignified death in the presence of family and relatives, many of the homeless choose not to contact their families until the end as they are afraid of their loved ones discovering their circumstances. Further, the Personal Information Protection Act means that we are unable to search for families of the homeless unless the homeless volunteer their contact information. The head of our facility and our staff were intent on finding Mr. Gwak's family, although he had already passed away. Finally, through the hospital and ward office, we were able to locate his family. Through our efforts, we were finally able to give Mr. Gwak's son news of his father, who had left home 15 years ago.

A father had left home after his business failed when his son was just getting started in the 8th grade, returning only after his death. His wife lived in the same house, waiting, for 15 years, and his parents were waiting to hear from their son. Even his siblings came from the United States to forgive and make amends, and the funeral that followed was a heartwarming one. Mr. Gwak's family were deeply thankful for our efforts taking care of him. Even his son, who was angry at the news, ended up forgiving his father. The heavenly sendoff culminated in a funeral in the presence of Mr. Gwak's son and siblings. Watching Mr. Gwak's son weep as his father was cremated was a heartbreaking experience, but one that we were glad we could make happen.

The members of Seolgoksan Dail Community invest a great deal of time and effort picking the flowers to be washed and dried so that they can be served as flower tea to the visitors. At Seolgoksan Dail Community, you can walk along the Way of the Cross and share your stories from the bottom of your heart, while drinking a hot cup of tea with others.
